Our new Family Orientation is postponed until June- Date to be announced.

Exploration days!

Exploration Days Orientation – Those attending Exploration Days should plan on attending the orientation on Thursday, May 9th at the Kalamazoo County Fairgrounds and Expo Center . We'll start promptly at 6:30 pm with a short presentation and time for Q & A. This is an opportunity for the youth to sign up for roommates, sign up to ride the bus, meet your chaperones, learn about expectations, and ask

questions.



- May 25- All participants must be fully paid. All cancellations after May 25th will lose \$120 of their payment. Refunds for the amount paid beyond \$120 will be processed in July.
- June 15- All cancellations after this point are considered no show and refunds will not be given.
- June 19-21- 4-H Exploration Days at Michigan State University



There will be 4 YQCA (Youth for the Quality Care of Animals) in 2024. This is a requirement for all youth bringing livestock for auction to the Kalamazoo County Youth Fair and Family Festival in 2024. There are two options, one of 4 face-to-face sessions or an online session. The face-to-face sessions will be a minimum of 1 hour and the cost is \$3.00 per youth. The face-to-face version is meant to include all youth 8 years old – 18 years old. The online version is \$12.00 but the curriculum is age specific. This certification is good for one year.

The face-to-face sessions will be held starting at 6:30PM on the following date May 15, 2024

Youth who would like to take the face-to-face session will need to do the following:

- Parents will need to create a family profile on https://yqcaprogram.org/
- Parents will need to add each child (if they are not already added) and chose the face-to-face training option.
- Pay the \$3.00 registration fee.
- Youth will need to complete the pre-test.
- Once the youth has taken the face-to-face session, staff will mark your session as complete.
- Youth will log back in and take the post test (found under the child's name and Their certificates are found under assigned certificates in the drop down).
- Once the post test is complete the youth's certificate will be sent.

Youth who would like to take the online session will need to do the following:

- Parents will need to create a family profile on https://yqcaprogram.org/
- Parents will need to add each child (if they are not already added) and chose the online training session.
- Pay the \$12.00 registration fee.
- Youth will then need to complete the course.

Once the youth have completed either the online session or the face-to-face session and receive their certificate, they will need to email it to msue.kalamazoo@msu.edu by June 1, 2024.

Goat Project Updates

Some highlights:

- You must attend at least 2 meetings to show at the fair in August.
 - The all-species meeting DOES count as one of those meetings if you attended.
 - YQCA does NOT count as a project meeting
 - The mandatory livestock meeting before fair does NOT count as a project meeting
- <u>ALL</u> goats coming to the fairgrounds, <u>whether being shown or not</u>, must be identified and have required pictures turned in with the registration form by 6/1/24. The form can be found here: <u>Goat Registration Form</u>
- Goats not identified are not eligible for exhibiting at fair and will not be allowed to be unloaded at the fairgrounds.

Remember:

Animals may not be shown in more than one 4-H sanctioned fair in a calendar year. But, MLE or other showcases not affiliated with MSU Extension 4-H are acceptable.

Welcome to the Swine Project!



Just a quick reminder - all 4-H pigs must be in your possession by **May 1st**, and registration forms with photos of tagged pigs are due by **May 1st** this year. Here is the link for the fillable description form: <u>4-H SWINE REGISTRATION (msu.edu)</u>,

(https://www.canr.msu.edu/kalamazoo/kalamazoo_county_4_h_1/Project-Guidelines/animal-1) Each exhibitor can show 2 pigs, and those exhibitors 16 years or older (4-H age) who showed swine last year can show 4 pigs. Please send your forms and pictures via email or text to me by May 1st.

If you still need ear tags, please let me know ASAP. Each pig needs to have 2 ear tags: one Kalamazoo County tag (orange or green) and one state USDA 840 ID tag (also called a premises tag). Each exhibitor can tag 5 pigs for Kalamazoo County, and family tagging is allowed.

Don't forget - YQCA (Youth for Quality Care of Animals) certification is required annually (for all species). If you haven't already completed this, the last remaining in-person training date is <u>May 15 at 6:30 PM at the Expo Center</u>.

Pre-registration is required at the YQCA website prior to attending, and the registration fee is \$3.00. Further details can be found in this month's 4-H newsletter.

Our next swine meeting is scheduled for **Wednesday**, **May 29th at 6:30 pm**. At this meeting we will have individual doses of the swine flu vaccine available. As a reminder, all pigs coming to our fair must be vaccinated for swine influenza (original dose plus a booster dose prior to July 15). There are several ways you can accomplish this:

a. If your breeder already vaccinated your pigs, please send me their name, name of the vaccine, and the dates of administration

b. If you or your local vet are vaccinating your pigs, please send me the name of who is administering, name of the vaccine, and the dates of administration c. If you want to administer it yourself, we will have individual doses of vaccine available at our next meeting on May 29, but please let me know by May 1st how many doses you'll need. The Zoetis FluSure vaccine comes in a 50-dose bottle, and has to be used within 24 hours once we mix it up, so we can offer individual doses on May 29th, which will have to be given to your pigs either that night or the next day. We will then have a second round of doses available on June 19, to complete the required vaccinations. (Bonus - due to a generous sponsorship from Co-Alliance we are able to offer the vaccines this year at no cost to the exhibitors.)

2024 Kalamazoo County Youth Fair Camping Fees & Information CAMPING RESERVATIONS



The Kalamazoo County Parks & Expo Center will be handling all the camping reservations again this year.

Beginning on May 1, 2024 you must call to make your reservation directly with the Expo Center at 269-383-8778

Camping Fees: Weekly Rate - \$150.00 per week (8/5-8/11) Reservations made after July 28 are \$180 per week

Advance Reservation Fee: One-time \$5.00 fee will be charged for all advance reservations

Golf Carts:All golf carts must be pre-registered. Golf cart permits are \$25 each. After July 28 fee is
\$100. You must be 18 years of age, have a valid driver's license and provide proof of
liability insurance to operate a golf cart on the grounds.


Septic Service:

A dump station with potable water is available on the grounds. On-site septic service will be available by pre-registration with your camping reservation for \$40 per dump. Dumps will be scheduled for Thursday, August 8.

Deadline for Camping Registration July 28, 2024 Campground check-in will take place from 9-6pm on Monday, August 5. No early arrivals.

Camping Information:

- Camping will be reserved by campground area at time of reservation (see map for campground areas) and specific site numbers will be emailed out approximately 1 week prior to arrival. We will try to accommodate special requests. All requests will be considered in order by date of reservation.
- Campers may not switch from assigned site number upon arrival. All reservations must be paid by credit card at the time of reservation. There is a non-refundable \$5 reservation fee for each campsite reserved. Most sites offer water and electric hook-up.
- Showers and handicapped-accessible restrooms are available.
- Cancellations will be accepted until July 28, 2024. Reservation fees are non-refundable. If you cancel your reservation by July 28, 2024 your refund will be the camping fees paid less a \$5 cancellation fee. No refunds are available for cancellations after July 28, 2024.



Program Details:

States' 4-H Summer Outbound programs provide American 4-H youth with the opportunity to travel to foreign countries for a month-long cultural immersion experience. Delegates live with volunteer host families* and engage in experiential learning about a new way of life. Delegates experience aspects of daily life that allow them to more deeply understand both their host culture and their own culture. Our network of like-minded international partners recruit host families and plan enrichment activities.

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2024 OUTBOUND PROGRAMS

States' 4-H International's mission is to enhance world understanding and global citizenship; one way to move towards that goal is through living with a local host family and immersing oneself in another culture.



Program Fees Include:

Welcome packet; overnight national departure orientation; arrival orientation in host country; portion of chaperone fee; Accident & Sickness Medical Insurance; in-country transportation, lodging, and meals while on-program; countryspecific activities as determined by international partner organizations; overnight national departure debriefing upon return.

Program Policies:

- Program Cancellations:
 - No refund of paid deposits, unless full program cancelled by States' 4-H
- Airfare is non-refundable once issued
- In-State Fees may apply
- Unaccompanied Minor fees may apply (up to \$150 each way)
- Program details subject to change

FAQs:

Q: Will a chaperone accompany the group?

A: Yes! Adult chaperones accompany the group during international travel and remain in-country to provide support during the exchange.

Q: Do I need to speak another language?

A: No prior language study is required, but it is certainly helpful! Our international partners have English-speaking staff on hand to assist you in communication.

Q: How will States' 4-H prepare me for my homestay? A: States' 4-H provides travel handbooks that cover everything from packing lists to financial matters to cultural information. In addition, each state may conduct a spring orientation covering these topics. Delegates also receive details during the States' 4-H group conference call in late spring and a National

Departure Orientation the day before the international flight.

Michigan 4-H Youth Code of Conduct

The opportunity to participate in or attend 4-H activities is a privilege. All 4-H participants – youth, families, volunteers, and Extension staff who participate in or attend any activity or event sponsored by the Michigan State University Extension 4-H Youth Development Program are expected to uphold the values of the Michigan 4-H program.



All 4-H youth participants must conduct themselves according to the following standards that apply to all Michigan 4-H programs, including virtual programs, and interactions such as social media and internet engagement:

1. **Create a Welcoming Environment for All**. Encourage everyone to fully participate in 4-H. Recognize that all people have skills and talents that can help others and improve the community. Though we will not always agree, we must disagree respectfully. When we disagree, try to understand why. Our first priority is to create a safe, inclusive space for learning, sharing and collaboration that is welcoming to people from diverse backgrounds, cultures, and perspectives. Diversity includes, but is not limited to race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, religion, age, height, weight, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or veteran status.

2. **Bring Your Best Self.** Conduct yourself in a manner that reflects honesty, integrity, self-control, and selfdirection. Accept the results and outcomes of 4-H activities and programs with grace and empathy for other participants. Accept the final opinions of judges and evaluators. Be open to new ideas, suggestions, and opinions of others.

3. **Obey the Law.** Obey the laws of the locality, state and nation and Michigan State University and Extension policies and guidelines. Commit no illegal acts. Do not possess, offer to others, or use alcohol, illegal drugs, marijuana, or tobacco products, which include e-pens, e-pipes, e-hookah, e-cigars, JUULs, vapes, vape pens or other electronic nicotine delivery systems. Do not attend 4-H activities under the influence of alcohol or illegal substances. Do not possess or use weapons or firearms except as expressly permitted as part of supervised 4-H shooting sports programming. This includes dangerous or unauthorized materials such as explosives or similar items.

4. Honor Diversity – Yours and Others'. Respect and uphold the rights and dignity of all persons with whom you interact as part of Michigan 4-H.

5. **Create a Safe Environment.** Be kind and compassionate toward others. Be considerate and courteous of all persons and their property. Do not carelessly or intentionally harm or intimidate anyone in any way (verbally, mentally, physically, or emotionally). Do not insult, harass, or bully others or engage in other hostile behaviors, including sexual harassment, sexual assault or sexual abuse. Abstain from sexual behavior and intimate physical/sexual contact in either public or private situations at an MSU Extension youth 4-H activity or event.

6. **Be a Team Player.** Work cooperatively with all individuals involved in 4-H programs and activities. Be responsive to the reasonable requests of the person in charge such as volunteers and staff. Respect the integrity of the group and the group's decisions.

7. Humane Treatment of Animals. Treat animals humanely and provide appropriate animal care.

8. **Participate Fully.** Participate in and contribute to planned programs, be on time and follow through on assigned tasks/responsibilities in a manner that fosters the safety, well-being, and quality of the educational experience for self and others.

Michigan 4-H Foundation opens 2024-25 grant cycle

Awarded annually, the Michigan 4-H Foundation recently opened their grant and award opportunities for the 2024-2025 season. Open to 4-H volunteer leaders, members and staff, the grants and awards support local 4-H clubs and county programs, as well as recognize members of the 4-H community. **All applications are due June 1.**

Opportunities include:

- ^o Michigan 4-H Legacy Grants of \$1,000. These grants are awarded to support development of a new program or initiative or to strengthen, enhance or expand a current program that is making a difference.
- 4-H On-Target Grants of \$500. These grants support 4-H Shooting Sports programs to enhance existing programs, develop a new program or offer a special experience related to 4-H Shooting Sports.
- The Collins 4-H Youth Horticulture Grant of \$500. This grant is available only to 4-H youth clubs and supports advancement of club work in plant science and horticulture activities.
- ° 4-H Educational Garden Grants of \$1,000. These grants support the creation of local 4-H educational gardens in Michigan.
- ^o Michigan Farm Bureau 4-H Excellence in Agriculture Award (includes \$1,000 grant). This award recognizes outstanding 4-H agricultural volunteers that have exhibited excellence in 4-H youth education and leadership development.

Tips for purchasing and bringing home livestock

Acquiring new stock is exciting whether you are building your herd or flock or purchasing your annual 4-H project. These tips will help manage their health and safety by making sure you know what to ask before purchasing and how to prepare to bring livestock home.

Assessing Animal Health and Treatment Documentation

When purchasing animals, you should know their history. Ask the following questions:

- When was the animal born?
- What specific vaccinations has the animal been given and when were they given?
- If necessary, was the animal properly castrated and what method was used?
- Have any other treatments been administered to the animal? If so, what is the slaughter withdrawal for the drugs given?
- Have any of the animals on the farm been ill or shown symptoms of illness?
- If acquiring a market animal, what is the approximate weight?

Considerations as You Bring Animals Home

Transporting. Secure a trailer. If you do not own a trailer, make arrangements with someone who can transport animals for you. Be prepared to pay someone to provide transportation, as a courtesy.

Unloading. Make sure that your facility is ready to house your new animals before they arrive. Have a pen identified for new animals to go into with fresh water and appropriate feed. (Feed should be similar to their previous diet; changing to a new diet should be done over a period of time.) Have a clear and direct path to the animals' new pen from the trailer. Make sure that all gates are open or closed, as appropriate, and secured.

Settling in. Isolate or separate new animals for a minimum of 14 days. At minimum, try to avoid nose-to-nose contact, and comingling feeding and watering. Minimize stress on new animals during the isolation period. If after 14 days, the newly acquired animals have not shown any symptoms of illness, it should be safe to comingle them into your existing herd or flock.

Comingling. Since each species has a social hierarchy, observe animals during comingling and separate if there is risk of injury. Over the course of a day, the herd or flock should settle into a routine that includes the new animals.
