82 participants received education during this event.



Rebecca Krans helped to coordinate a "Down on the Farm" family-friendly activity at the Iron County Fair. It consisted of various organizations around the area providing an educational activity at a booth in the fair's rotunda. We had Northern Beekeeping (two volunteers) with a live hive demo, beekeeping supplies and resources, Iron/Baraga Conservation District (two volunteers) providing a butterfly house activity along with pollinator and invasive species information, the UP Rodeo Princess with her western saddle and a roping activity, Buttons the Clown with fun giveaways, Iron County 4-H Program Coordinator, Anne, with fun activities and 4-H giveaways and information, and an Extension Master Gardener Volunteer and three Miss Iron County participants assisting youth with coloring and fun farm activities.180 participants at this event.

ServSafe® Program

Michigan State University Extension offers ServSafe®, a national certification program for those working in food service, specifically managers and other leaders.

ServSafe® teaches about foodborne illness, how to prevent it and how to train employees about the latest food safety issues. The ServSafe® Manager course uses proven techniques, provides new Food & Drug Administration food code rules and content related to the food industry. This course provides participants education to successfully pass the ServSafe® Food Protection Manager Certification exam.

Topics include: providing safe food, forms of contamination, the safe food handler, the flow of food, food safety management systems, safe facilities & pest management, cleaning & sanitizing.

Stephanie Ostrenga-Sprague led this **8-hour ServSafe® class** in Crystal Falls at the Iron County Courthouse for **9 participants**.

UP Regional 4-H Shooting Sports Tournament

U.P. Regional 4-H Shooting Sports Tournament held on June 11 in Escanaba, MI. The tournament was almost cancelled due to low registration. Iron County volunteers were very motivated to have their 4-H club members attend. Their additional registrations allowed the event to be held. Four volunteers from two clubs attended with Iron County 4-H members.

Iron County 4-H Exploration Days and Local Scholarships

37 youth and seven adults (including two program coordinators) from the Western UP counties of Houghton-Keweenaw, Ontonagon, Gogebic, Iron, Dickinson, and Marquette attended 4-H Exploration Days. This included eight youth from Houghton-Keweenaw Counties and three youth from Iron County. The group enjoyed a side trip to the Great Wolf Lodge. They also enjoyed a pre-Exploration presentation and tour of Michigan State University's <u>Veterinary Diagnostic Laboratory</u> where they got to try out various clinician training stations.

The **Iron County 4-H Council** offered \$100 scholarships to youth attendees who met scholarship criteria (two Iron County youths were recipients of this scholarship).
