OBJECTIVE: The 4-H and FFA members that participate in the Dairy Judging Contest shall learn to evaluate young and milking dairy female cattle based on the traits by which they are judged in competitive Classes.

The American Judging System shall be used in this section. Premium money shall be paid to the five (5) groups, based on the three (3) highest individuals in each group (any number may enter but the highest three (3) individuals shall represent the group in the final team placings). Reason shall be required in case of a tie. The contest shall consist of two (2) rings of dairy animals.

- A. A member may show and sell only one (1) market beef animal.
- B. The member may exhibit only one (1) animal in CLASS 42 or 43 and must sell that animal in the livestock auction.
- C. Market Beef eligible must have been on feed and owned by the exhibitor since February 1 of the year shown.
- D. Any market steers, market heifers, or breeding stock with horns over one inch shall not be allowed to stay and or exhibit at the Fair.
- E. A "Rate of Gain" Award shall be presented to the 4-H member that exhibits the Market Beef animal with the highest daily rate of gain (pounds gained per day). Market Beef for the "Rate of Gain" contest shall have been weighed-in on a date and at the locations approved by the Jackson County 4-H Livestock Association Large Animal Committee.
- F. Showmanship is mandatory and showmanship ages are as of January 1, of the year of the Fair.

- G. If showing a registered animal in Sections 1 through 7 you must show registration papers in the exhibitor's name to the beef superintendents.
- H. A member shall be 8 years to 19 years old during this calendar year (Jan. 1 -Dec. 31) to exhibit and sell market beef.
- No premiums given in Showmanship Classes, but awards are furnished by the Jackson County 4-H Livestock Association or sponsors they secure.
- J. Feeder Class heifers shown in Section 8 Feeder Calves cannot be shown in breeding.
- K. Feeders do not sell at the auction.
- L. Exhibitor must make own arrangements to take animal home on Saturday night at the end of the Fair. See 4-H website for further rules and information.

RULES

- A. EXHIBITOR AND OWNER SHALL BE THE SAME PERSON.
- B. No sheep is eligible unless the exhibitor has had the sheep in his/her possession since May 1 of the current year. All sheep are required to have a USDA Scrapie identification tag.
- C. Animals may be washed in designated areas only.
- D. All sheep will be checked at weigh-in for any sign of fungus, footrot, and sustained prolapses. Lambs that have a sustained prolapse will be sent home. Sustained prolapse will be determined at the discretion of the superintendents as with any other medical conditions deeming the animal not sound. If any of the above conditions exist, the sheep will be quarantined for veterinary inspection and decision. The Superintendents will make final decisions based on total evaluations.
- E. The trimming/shearing area MUST be cleaned up immediately.
- F. Superintendents will police for and rules violations. Violations will result in the removal of the animal(s) from the show.
- G. Exhibitors will be responsible for the care and feeding of their animals through Saturday when the animals are released.
- H. Sheep are to be shown with all four feet on the ground or ring surface, after the lamb has been set.

- No muzzles.
- J. No bark or sawdust bedding permitted. Only straw, white pine or cedar shavings are allowed.
- K. Water must be always available in penspresent at all times.
- L. Humane handling practices of sheep at all times. No hitting or slapping of sheep during shows or any other time during fair week.
- M. No liquid feeding allowed, including drenching.
- N. Tampering and/or misrepresentation as to the breeding, age, ownership, and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception. Any premiums, awards or sale money won by such an exhibitor will be withheld.
- O. Unethical fitting is not permitted.
- P. No altering of hide.
- Q. No injections to alter conformation.
- R. No coloring agents are allowed, including but not limited to any product which changes, enhances or alters the natural color of an animal such as paints, dye, powder, non-clear adhesive, foam or shoe polish.
- S. Records of pen cleaning will be kept by the Superintendents.
- T. After receiving ONE (1) warning for pen cleaning violation, the exhibitor will be fined \$50.00 for each additional infraction

RULES

- A. Any livestock unloaded before being checked in will be disqualified and removed from the fairgrounds.
- B. Your goat <u>must have</u> one of the following types of identification to be allowed at fair:
 - a. United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) goat scrapie tag attached to their ear.
 - b. Registered breeding stock may have an official breed registration tattoo in their ear. A copy of the registration certificate listing the tattoo must accompany the goat to fair. Tattoo must be legible at check in.
 - c. For non-registered goats with no ears or injured ears (ex LaMancha), the scrapie tag must be attached to an adjustable collar to be worn at all times at fair. A tail flap tattoo will not be accepted for id.

- d. Breeds that allow it, (ex. pygmy) can be microchipped but must carry the registration papers with the goat and provide a microchip reader.
 - i. All market wethers must have a scrapie tag in their ear, or a tag attached to a collar.
 - ii. All imported goats must meet the above identification rules and have an Interstate Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) from the state of origin. The CVI must include the results of a negative brucellosis test for goats six months or older, except wethers.
 - iii. All goats **without** proper scrapie tags or tattoo with paperwork will be sent home. Contact Superintendents prior to fair for assistance.
- C. All goat kids born for the current fair need to be born by April 1 of the current year. This applies to all breeds and includes does and wethers. Possession date for all yoats is May 1.
- D. Exhibitors are limited to 1 entry per Class and can a bring total of 4 goats.
- E. Any Classes can be changed or combined due to size by Superintendents.
- F. Breeding stock may be shown with or without horns if Breed Standard allows (Pygmy, Fiber breeds, Boer breeds). Boer wethers may be shown with or without horns. All Dairy breeds must be dehorned. All dehorned goats must have "healed horns".
- G. A total of 2 goats may be sold at auction. All Boer/Meat Goat wethers and Dairy Market wethers must be sold at the auction.
- H. In addition to fair entry forms, 4-H goat registration forms must be turned into the Goat Superintendents on May 4th from 10am to Noon at the Extension Office. Please contact Superintendents prior to May 4th if unable to attend.
- All livestock exhibitors shall comply with the most current MDA health requirements for livestock exhibited in Michigan. All livestock exhibitors shall also comply with the rules & bylaws of both Large & Small Animal Associations, 4-H Jackson Co. Goat project, & all rules & requirements of the Jackson Co Fair.
- J. Project fees are \$5.00 per participant due at check in.
- K. CHECKOUT & CLEANUP:
 - a. Decoration tear down Saturday 10pm to 11pm or Sunday 9am to 11am Goat check out Sunday **only** 9am to 11am.

RULES

- A. At check-in, exhibitors must indicate if they are entering their swine as Homegrown, Purebred, or Crossbred.
- B. The H1N1 vaccine is required for all swine entries. Proof must be shown at Check-In. Any hog not vaccinated will not be permitted to show and will not be able to stay on the fairgrounds.
- C. All exhibitors are required to present their YQCA certificate card at the time of weigh-in.
- D. Eligibility for Purebred Class the exhibitor must have purebred certification in the exhibitor's name for the animal to show in purebred Classes.

- Purebreds will be verified at check in.
- **E.** Please see the Livestock Association By-laws for a Definition of Homegrown.
- **F.** There shall be no swine breeding or feeder pig Classes.
- **G.** The Jackson County Fair requires that all swine shall have official identification dearly visible.
- **H.** All hogs are required to have a minimum hair length of 1/2 inch.
- I. All Market Hogs for show may be unloaded and placed in a pen assigned to their 4-H/FFA club prior to weigh-in time. Vehicles that are used to bring hogs in shall use the Blackstone St Gate by the river and exit out the North St gate. They shall

- not be allowed entry at any other gate.
- J. Exhibitors who have made weight 220 and above in swine may bring 2 hogs consisting of one barrow and one gilt or two of the same gender (i.e. two barrows or two gilts). All hogs shall be shown as individuals. No pairs shall be shown. Exhibitors shall receive one (1) premium only.
- K. Exhibitors whose hogs do not make weight 219 and below are able (under superintendent's discretion) to keep one pig at the fair to show in showmanship and in the Super Light Division classes. Super Light Division hogs are unable to sell in the auction and the exhibitors are responsible for the transportation of their animal home.
- L. A member 8 yrs. old to 19 yrs. old during this current calendar year (Jan 1st- Dec.31st) may exhibit and sell a maximum of two (2) market hogs. All market hogs 220 and above exhibited can be sold in the auction or the 4-H/FFA member can reserve the right to take hogs or her animal home (i.e. Champions have to be auctioned) and notify the superintendent immediately after the show

- M. Any hog shown over the weight of 290 lbs. can be sold in the auction, but the owner/exhibitor will only be paid up to 290 lbs.
- N. Showmanship is mandatory.
- O. Exhibitor and owner shall be the same person.
- P. This is a non-terminal show (subject to change based on MDA recommendations)
- Q. Educational displays or posterboards are required to be placed in the Exhibitors pens or barn the Friday morning after load out. This is in place of the project books.
- R. No premiums given in Showmanship Classes, but trophies are furnished by the Jackson County 4-H Livestock Association or sponsors they secure.

RULES

- A. Set up for check-in will take place on Friday night at 4:00pm. Only the birds of the check-in volunteers will be checked in at this time, but check-in packets will be available. If you pick up a packet early, you must return it at check in. No replacements will be available.
- B. Project fees are \$5.00 per participant.
- C. Pens must be cleaned by 10:00 A.M. each day.
- D. Breeding projects must have a half sheet listing with a brief history of the breed and why the exhibitor chose the breed displayed on the pen. Listing must be neat, readable and in a durable format that will last the entire fair week (i.e., laminated, mounted on cardstock, etc.).
- E. Market Poultry exhibitor and parent shall sign a "Consent to Sell" form.
- F. All poultry shall be inspected for cleanliness, external parasites, and health at check-in. Any dirty or unhealthy birds or birds with parasites shall be sent home.
- G. All breeder poultry shall be at least 20 weeks of age.

- H. 4-H members are responsible for keeping their pens clean and the animals fed and watered. Food must be available during fair hours and may be removed at night.
- All poultry exhibitors shall have registered all projects with the poultry superintendent by May 1st.
- J. Record books for all poultry are required and due at check-in. Record books are to be complete and neat. Unfinished books will not be accepted, and projects will not checked in.

- K. Market birds are shown as a pen of three except for market turkeys and geese, which are a single bird. Breeder poultry are shown as a pair (one male and one female) or a trio (one male and two females) or a single hen or a single rooster. Breeder turkeys and geese are shown as a pair (one male and one female) only. Breeder ducks are shown as a pair (one male and one female) or a trio (one male and two females). Production trio are three female birds of the same breed and age purchased according to the Poultry Expectation guidelines.
- L. All live birds are released after the close of fair on Sunday morning between 8am-10am. All market birds left on Sunday morning after 10 A.M. shall be sent to the processor.
- M. One entry per member shall be registered with the Fair Office for premium. All projects are to be registered with the Poultry Superintendent.
- N. Any fowl may be used for showmanship with superintendent prior approval.
- Exhibitors of other fowl may use a chicken exhibitor's bird with exhibitor prior permission.
- P. In addition to the MDARD and Jackson County Fair rules, exhibitors will follow the By-Laws of the Jackson County Small Animal Association which are available on the Extension Office website. A signed copy of the By-Laws Agreement Form is required at check-in, or birds will not be permitted into the barn.
- Q. Exhibitor and owner shall be the same person.
