Agriculture



Mason County boasts a diverse agricultural economy that produces over \$85 million annually, 72% in crop sales and 28% in livestock.

MSU Extension is helping to make a difference in Mason County.

Highlights of MSU Extension Agricultural support in 2023: Mason County has a long history of dependence on natural resources, and in particular agriculture, as a strong source of identity and economic prosperity. MSU Extension provided education and support to Mason County residents through a variety of targeted workshops and services.

The Stakenas farm participated in a parlor evaluation. The evaluation, using VaDia technology, was performed to examine current milking practices and to gather data to develop tailored milker training. The evaluation was also used to provide recommendations to increase milking efficiency on the farm and a milker training session was implemented to reinforce proper milking practices.

Mason County farmers took advantage of a webinar focused on creating a farm business plan. The business plan helps to evaluate alternatives, identify market opportunities, and communicate ideas to potential lenders and business partners. Participants explored how to understand what lenders look for in a business plan when farms are seeking loan financing.

A tree and shrub planting presentation was organized and MSU Extension staff gave a presentation about backyard fruit tree care. This program was designed for landowners and professionals such as foresters, ecologists, and loggers, interested in planting trees and shrubs.

West Central Horticulture Breakfast Meetings are seasonal meetings for tree fruit growers to share timely information, weather updates, and pest and disease information about ongoing or emerging issues. The meetings were well attended by Mason County residents and allowed for sharing of information with growers and engagement with industry members who sponsored the breakfast each week.

Asparagus Day and Spring Horticulture Day provided opportunities for farmers to hear the latest research results and industry updates for various commodities. Coupled with one-on-one farm visits and local research plots, Extension services remain an essential piece of a thriving agricultural economy.

Additionally, in the spring of 2023 MSU Extension relaunched soil testing services for both home and commercial purposes. Both segments took advantage of the testing and accompanying analysis that MSU Extension soil testing services produces.
