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How is the Michigan Naturalist Program Organized?

Three seasons of monthly Saturday sessions will take us to a variety of different settings within the Southwest Michigan region. The class will begin indoors with the day's topics followed by field experiences guided by engaging naturalists and researchers.

Internet access is a must for this hyflex training experience. You will be asked to review inline materials and complete course readings and knowledge checkpoints for each



topic. The field portion of each class necessitates that participants are prepared to hike moderate distances with variable steep and/or rough terrain. Please contact us if special accommodations must be made.*

Automobile transportation is necessary; carpooling is encouraged. Participants are responsible for entry fees to field sites (Michigan passport, park fees, etc.)
