



PURPOSE: To organize and supervise judging, exhibits, and activities in the 4-H division at the Monroe County Fair in conjunction with the Monroe County Fair Association, Fair Executive Board and Fair Manager to make the 4-H division a learning experience for all youth.

- Be an approved 4-H volunteer through the Volunteer Selection Process
- Abide by the MSU Extension Volunteer Code of Conduct
- Have familiarity with the Monroe County 4-H Program
- Ability to work with adults and youth, and on a team

- Ability to organize and supervise
- Flexible and responsive to change for the good of the total program and those who participate

RESPONSIBILITIES:

- Use the Fair Advisory Board as the governing body for all changes in the 4-H fair division.

- Serve as an adult advisor, attending meetings of the Junior Livestock Association, including Caprine Council and Dairy Board
- Attend and supervise workshops and clinics, including tagging dates, and other association sponsored events such as Buyer Banquet
- Be present for haul out of all animals

PERFORM DUTIES

Pre-Fair

- Encourage participation to write letters to buyers to attend the auction.
- Find packer/buyers to submit bids for sale day.

Fair Week

- Fair Days
 - Superintendent needs to be present during livestock arrival and departure times.
 - Supervise fair weigh-in, if applicable.
 - Work with 4-H Tech Committee to break classes, develop a show bill, and list animals going through the auction, if applicable.
 - Be available to answer questions from exhibitors, parents, leaders, and 4-H staff.
 - Work with 4-H Program Coordinator to clarify any discrepancies in eligibility of animals or youth.
 - Support appropriate animal welfare practices for an attractive public display.
- Show Days & JLA Auction
 - Prior to show, get ribbons, trophies, and judging books from the 4-H Headquarters Office.
 - During show, designate a committee member to perform each of the following duties:
 - Ring Announcer, Check 4-H'ers into the ring, Ring person to help exhibitors, Record ribbon placings (also be sure all "no shows" or changes are noted), Record champion placings for news releases, Return notebook to the 4-H Office promptly following the show, Orient judge on day of show. Be sure judge gets refreshments. At conclusion of show, give judge the check, which is in the front of the judging book.
- Auction
 - Post sale bill in JLA barn(s).
 - Direct traffic through barns and release correct animals to buyers.

Post-Fair

Assist in the cleanup of all livestock barns on Sunday following the Fair.

As a General or Assistant General Superintendent for the 4-H Division of the Monroe County Fair, I understand that I am expected to fulfill the above responsibilities.

Horse & Pony

ATTEND

- Serve as an adult advisor, attending meetings of the Monroe County H&P Board, including various committee meetings
- Attend and supervise workshops and clinics, including May paperwork turn in and other association sponsored events such as Banquet and Tack Sale
- Be present for haul in and out of animals

PERFORM DUTIES

Early in the Year

- Oversee the 4-H Tack Sale fundraiser (supports funds needed for fair)
- Assign adult and teen volunteers to committees such as (open show, fair show, awards, state point, arena, sponsorship) and conduct trainings/orientation related to the duties of each committee
- Revise and disperse registration paperwork due back "May 1st"
- Secure judges for open shows, fair and report back to 4-H Program Coordinators
- Oversee the planning of 4-H horse Shows and leveling dates (May/Clinic, June shows are used for state show points and as fundraisers to support programs at fair)
- Implement fiscally sound practices, use budgets, keep 1 year of expenses to carry over to next year.

Pre-Fair

- Collect registration paperwork (May 1 paperwork) at the Leader Pre-Fair Meeting
- Report Coggins and vaccination records collected with the May 1 paperwork to the fair office and 4-H Staff.
- Attend barn setup and coordinate work bees, repairs of barn/stall areas, acquisition of materials and equipment, fitting of riding arena(s), opening of the announcer's booth, etc.
- Support State 4-H Show registration and compile points earned locally
- Assign stalls and coordinate facility usage for the fair week
- Develop club schedule for barn duty, arena duty, booth operation, etc.
- Make arrangements with Fair office to secure equipment and access to water for arena maintenance throughout fair week

Fair Week

- Superintendent are present during animal arrival and departure times and over animal health checks
- Work with head of technology to break classes, develop a show bill, record results and other miscellaneous technology needs throughout the week
- Ensure that classes and riding patterns are posted in a timely manner prior to the start of a show
- Conduct daily herdsmanship checks, animal health observations and oversee the schedule of various club duties (night guard duty, gate duty, booth assignments, etc.)
- Be available to answer questions from exhibitors, parents, leaders, and 4-H staff.
- Work with 4-H Program Coordinator to clarify any discrepancies in eligibility of animals or youth.
- Support appropriate animal welfare practices for an attractive public display.
- Prior to shows, get ribbons, trophies, and judging books from the 4-H Headquarters Office.
- During each show, designate either a committee member to perform each of the following duties:
 - Ring Announcer
 - O Check 4-H'ers into the ring
 - Assign a ring assistant to help exhibitors and/or judge
 - o Record ribbon placings (also be sure all "no shows" or changes are noted)
 - Orient judge(s) on day of show and make sure refreshments are provided to judge(s)
 - At conclusion of show, give judge the check, which is in the front of the judging book.
 - o Return notebook to the 4-H Office promptly following the show

Post-Fair

- Assist in the cleanup of all barns on Sunday following the Fair.
- Oversee the winterizing of barn and announcers booth
- Conduct a debrief meeting with superintendents to review the week and gather input for next year (including updates to wish list)



Shooting Divisions as follows:

- Barebow Division Compound, Long, or Recurve bows without sights or bowmarks. Fingers Only
 (No release aid). Will use a 60cm Target.
- **Sighted Division** Compound, Long, Recurve, or Olympic recurve bows WITH any type of <u>Fixed</u> sight or bowmarks. Fingers Only (No release aid). Will use a 40cm Target.
- **Bowhunter Division** Compound bows WITH a Fixed sight (single or multi pins) which CAN NOT be adjusted once scoring begins and using a manually triggered release aid.
- Freestyle Division Compound bows WITH Adjustable sights and a manually triggered release aid (NO BACK TENSION releases**).

**Bowhunter & Freestyle will have the choice of shooting a 40 cm Single Spot Target or a Three Spot Vertical targets.

General Info:

- **Mandatory equipment: Hip quivers** and an **Arm Guard** (to be worn on the contestant's bow arm).
- All contestants should have prior shooting event experience, such as County, Regional or State level.
- All contestants will supply their own archery equipment, all bows should be cased until arriving at the range. Before the tournament begins ALL equipment will be inspected by the Range Officer(s).

For this tournament we will be following the **Tri-CAT Rules**.

Competition for all divisions will be as follows: 10 ends of 3 arrows @ 2 minutes per end. There will be one practice end before scoring begins. Awards for 1st, 2nd & 3rd place per age bracket and division will be presented following the completion of the tournament.
