

Sanilac County 4-H Program

4-H is the largest youth development program in Michigan. Its motto is "To make the best better." 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
4-H Program Highlights

Environmental & Outdoor Education

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Animal Agriculture

The Thumb Area is one of the most populated in the state when it comes to cattle. MSU Extension's Jerad Jaborek, Beef Feedlot Educator, offered programs to help producers with a variety of issues. These workshops were offered throughout the Thumb Area.

One of those workshops was titled *Implant Boot Camp* where participants learned that cattle ear implants are a safe and effective technology that utilizes hormones to improve body weight gain, feed efficiency, and leanness in steers and heifers raised for beef. The in-person and hands-on training programs offered in collaboration with Zoetis's Sarah Messing, were provided in both Peck and Bad Axe. A presentation discussing what cattle implants were, the expected improvement in animal performance and return on investment, proper implant management, implant products available, and new FDA labeling changes were covered during lunch. Attendees were able to practice implanting cattle with the newly learned information pertaining to implant sanitation and proper ear implant placement.



Beef Carcass Ultrasound

Recognized as a need by the Michigan cattle feeding industry, Jerad, along with colleagues Kevin Gould and Phil Durst presented the *Feedlot Health and Management Program* for feedlot personnel focused on basic animal handling and recognizing feedlot cattle with health concerns. MSU Extension Beef educators discussed topics relevant to the program. Michigan State University veterinarian, Jessica Gordon, also participated by discussing the importance of working with your veterinarian to prevent and treat common illnesses observed in feedlot cattle.

In 2023, Jerad became a certified *Beef Carcass Ultrasound* technician. He has been working with beef seedstock producers, county fairs, and the MCA/MSU Bull Evaluation Program to provide carcass ultrasound scanning data. Capturing carcass ultrasound images to measure ribeye size, back fat thickness, and marbling deposition provides a peak under the cattle hide without having to slaughter the animal. This gives seedstock producers a greater knowledge of the carcass potential of their bulls and heifers used for breeding through enhanced expected progeny differences (EPD). For county fairs, it allows exhibitors the ability to learn about carcass grading and how well their market steer's carcass performs relative to other steers in the show.

Agriculture and Agribusiness

The Thumb Area in particular has some of the richest farmland in the state allowing for high quality field crops to be produced. This past growing season, 10 soybean on-farm research plots were grown and harvested in the Thumb with the data collected to be used for future education.

MSU Extension's agriculture and agribusiness programs cover not only field crops, but programming that is relevant to area producers. In 2023, Sanilac County residents along with Huron and Tuscola County residents had the opportunity to participate in programming relating to several topics including *Restricted Use Pesticide Testing*, *Crop and Pest Management Updates*, and a *Regional Wheat Field Day* held right here in Thumb Area. Also offered to area residents was a *Farm Succession Planning Workshop*, as well as a family friendly *Farm Record-Keeping for Women in Ag* workshop. *Thumb Ag Day* is another opportunity for producers to not only be able to sit in on field crop and animal agriculture educational sessions, but it's also an opportunity for them to visit with local agribusinesses all under one roof during this day long event held at Ubly Heights each December.

4,729 live participants took part in the Field Crops Team Virtual Breakfast Series including 233 people from Sanilac County in 2023.

Another highly successful program offered by MSU Extension Field Crops Educators is the *Field Crops Team Virtual Breakfast Series*. Happening every Thursday morning during the growing season, this virtual series is geared toward farmers, agribusiness professionals, agency personnel, and others interested in agriculture. The series is flexible, fluid, and able to adapt to constantly changing conditions for crops. Valuable crop management information is shared to address potential and current issues related to weather, pest infestation, and crop disease. Emerging issues are addressed in a timely manner to help farmers increase efficiency and profitability for the farming operation. While all Field Crops Educators along with campus and industry experts are involved with this program, you can find Jenna in the background and Phil Kaatz at the helm of this project.

Her main focus in the beginning was *Senior Project Fresh* where she was able to give out 150 coupons to eligible Sanilac County seniors along with educational materials on the benefits of eating healthy fresh fruits and vegetables.


Another of Mary's focuses during her short time with MSU Extension has been a project called *The Last Food Mile*, which distributes three pound bags of seasonal produce to area residents. This produce is grown by local Amish farmers. Sanilac County received over 8,400 pounds of fresh produce which was distributed among residents at East Side Manor and Sunrise Village as well as on the Sanilac Transportation busses for patrons to benefit from. Over 200 people a week received this produce.

Mary along with colleague Carol Bublitz, took part in *Project Connect* where they offered two budgeting benefits presentations as well as a cooking demonstration. Project Connect is made up of community business members who provide resources to participants. A food distribution was also available. For the cooking demonstration, Mary and Carol used items from the food distribution to help people come up with ideas for recipes using the items they received as well as providing knowledge on food safety.

Mary has now shifted her focus to cooking, teaching a *Cooking Class for One* course in Sanilac County with plans for more Nutrition Instruction in the coming months.

Keeping Our Food Safe

There is a need for unbiased, science-based information on safe food practices. MSU Extension provides food safety education and outreach for home food preservers, entrepreneurs, childcare providers, consumers, foodservice workers, and volunteers aiming to reduce foodborne illness for all. Sanilac County residents participated in online and in-person classes offered by the Food Safety team including *Preserving MI Harvest Home Food Preservation, ServSafe Manager Certification, Michigan Cottage Food Law, Safe Food = Healthy Kids, Cooking for Crowds* and *Pantry Food Safety-It's Your Job!*

To provide additional food safety education, there were multiple resources to utilize. MSU Extension's Think Food Safety Facebook page is available for social media users. Think Food Safety shares food safety tips and information on a huge variety of topics, food preservation information, food recalls, upcoming class schedules and videos at your fingertips. Also available to Thumb Area residents online are Michigan Fresh fact sheets which are loaded with information on using, storing and preserving the Michigan Fresh Produce grown in your garden or purchased from local farmer's markets. Finally, the Food Safety Hotline (call 877.643.9882) is available to anyone having a food safety question of any type.
